# The United States of America.

To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

Whereas William Doake of Yazoo County Mississippi  
has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Jackson State of Mississippi  
whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said William Doake  
according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for  
the pre-emption granted to him by <sup>the</sup> Act of Congress passed on the 7th of May 1822, entitled "An Act granting a right of  
Pre-emption to Noble Osborne and William Doake" being the South half of Section Eighteen in Township Ten, of  
Range Five East, and the East half of Section Thirteen in Township Ten, of Range Four East, in the Choctaw District, and  
State of Mississippi (containing together six hundred and forty acres  
according to the official plat of the survey of the said lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been pur-  
chased by the said William Doake

**NOW KNOW YE,** That the **UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,** in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several  
acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have Given and Granted, and, by these presents do give and grant, unto the said William Doake and  
to his Heirs the said tract above described: To Have and to Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunities, and appur-  
tenances, of whatsoever nature, thereto belonging, unto the said William Doake  
and to his heirs and assigns forever.
